God first creates Man, and then leads Man towards Him.

Easter Vigil Mass started with the church enveloped in darkness. Slowly, light emerged from flickering candles lit from the Easter candle. With the church lighting up as the Gloria was sung, it reflected God's continual call for us to step into the light of new life.

The first group, led by Fr Joseph, visited the Rempang Children's Home, where one of the members of the group Mr Joseph Chng has been involved in educating the children of poor families for many years.

In Tanjung Balai, the group had a rosary session at the Sacred Heart Church followed by the Stations of the Cross outside.

The group also visited a church in Teluk Dalam and did the Stations of the Cross.

The second group, led by Thomas Wee, spent some meaningful time with 42 girls aged between 13 and 19, mostly orphans, who are cared for by three nuns. The group arranged

dinner for all after which the girl residents put up a show of songs and dances. Three members of the group sponsored three needy children for their education. Mr Wee has been supporting the needs of this orphanage for some time.

The following day was Palm Sunday and the group attended the open air procession before entering the Church of Christ the King for mass in Bahasa Indonesia.

He heard God's call of Christian Love

OU may have seen him on Sundays assisting the main celebrant during the 8.30am mass. He is Brother Andrew Lin, a friendly down-to-earth person with an infectious love for God.

He grew up in a Catholic family where he, his elder brother and younger sister were nurtured in daily prayer and faith formation by his parents. One would therefore think answering God's call to priesthood came naturally to him. After all, he graduated from Christian missionary schools - Maris Stella Primary School and Anglo-Chinese School and was actively involved in the church choir, youth communities and catechists' programmes from a young age and throughout his adulthood. So when 35-year-old Bro Andrew decided to answer God's call to the priestly vocation, none of his friends or family was surprised.

However, he confessed that he was initially drawn to the idea of marriage, primarily because of his love for children. Looking to replicate the love he received from his parents, he sought out relationships with girls in the hope that receiving romantic love could fulfil him and bring about a sense of self-worth. It was not meant to be as he soon realised his misperception of this form of love and self-centredness in pursuing it.

His turning point came when he attended "School of Witness", a 7-week retreat jointly organised by the Catholic Archdiocesan Youth Centre and ICPE Mission (Institute for World Evangelisation) Singapore where he experienced God's profound love for humankind and realised he too was a beloved son of God. This realisation led him to believe that he was searching for love in the wrong places, looking to receive but not to give. Said Bro Andrew: "I experienced a great sense of peace when I finally said no to the path of marriage."



Doubting no more, he started his 8-year seminary journey in 2015. He is now into the fifth year of his priesthood formation. He works with youths and relishes the opportunity to rekindle his love for youth ministerial formation because of his roots in youth and catechist work. It is also an affirmation to God's mysterious way of having prepared him for this path since young. Having gone through the same challenges, he feels that their "longing for an encounter with God their Father" resonates deeply with him and he is compelled to share his own experience of God's great love with them.

When asked about whether he will be able to relate to parishioners' various challenges in life, having grown up in a nurturing and loving environment, he says that he believes God's immense love for him will always guide him to listen, to share and ultimately, to imitate His love for everyone. Said Bro Andrew: "The circumstances surrounding most problems might be different but at the root, it is the longing for love."

Bro Andrew graduated from the National University of Singapore with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration and before he joined the seminary he worked as an insurance claims and investigation executive. He also held the position of a youth co-ordinator at his parish Church of the Holy Family. Trained classical pianoforte, he also in plays the organ, guitar and used to compose psalm music at leisure. Currently, he is attached specifically with the youth group in our parish and works with them once a week, typically on a Saturday or Sunday until the end of November this year. If you are keen to take him on in a game of chess, he will prove to be a formidable opponent. 🛡



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
